October 2023 Principal's Report for School Council

- Land Acknowledgment
- Thanks to everyone who attended our Meet the Teacher at the beginning of the year-we feel like it worked well, especially for students new to our school and in the younger grades, or for the grade 6 students transitioning to 'the new hallway'. As of the September 30th count we have 166 students in Kindergarten through Grade 9.
- We had our Awards Night at the beginning of September. We had a great turn out
- The Terry Fox run was on September 28th and went very well. We've raised \$1355.60 for the Terry Fox Foundation so far!
- It was Truth and Reconciliation Week at the end of September. All of our classes participated in lessons and activities-most throughout the entire week.
- All of the teachers have been working hard the first part of this year getting to know their students, using diagnostic tests and the resulting data to plan for instruction, ensuring that they have a good understanding of their students' strengths and needs. We also will spend time on October 20th to closely examine our data from last year's Provincial Achievement Tests, the diagnostic tests as well as a survey Grade 4-9 students completed this Fall. We are also fortunate to still have Mrs. Beaver working with our school who is a School Division Literacy and Numeracy Teacher.
- Goal Setting is October 18th and 19th. The online booking will be open on October 13th.
 If you are having any difficulty using it, please contact the office.
- Emergency Procedures: We are required to have six fire drills. So far, we have had one. We will have two more before Christmas, and the final three after. We are required to have one lockdown drill. We will send a letter home or by email before a lockdown drill. Other emergency procedures include Hold and Secure-this would happen if something happened in the community, but is not directly related to the school. Classes go on as normal, no one is allowed outside or in, doors are locked. Shelter in Place-if there is a natural disaster such as a tornado, and we need to keep the students safe inside.
- We continue to receive money for our breakfast program, but it is less than in previous years. We also provide lunch and fruit using this same funding and any donations we receive. We could use more donations this year.
- The Scholastic Book Fair was this week and was a great success! We earn a lot of money to pay for books for our library.
- Michelle-SWAT (Student Wellness Action Team) is up and running again in Jr. High. So far, we have picked the dress up days for the year, and they are planning Halloween activities for the K to 3 classes to participate in. It is a very good leadership opportunity for our students.

- Michelle-Vaping presentation

Upcoming events-We will be doing our Halloween Parade on Halloween in the Gym.
 (most likely at 1:00 PM) Parents are welcome to join us. The Remembrance Day
 assembly is on November 2nd. Everyone is welcome to attend. The Christmas Concert
 is December 14th and the Christmas Store is the week of the 4th. If you have any used
 Christmas bags you can donate, we would greatly appreciate them. We could also use
 plastic grocery bags to send their gifts home in.

- must be a registered charity with active CRN or registered non-profit with an active BRN

- * Signature grant requires independently audited financial records

Alberta blue cross built together grant (submission deadline Sept. 15)

- \$50,000 available to help fund outdoor projects that promote active living and wellness with an emphasis on children
- For community leagues, school councils, or other nonprofit organizations
- Application attached

World Wildlife Foundation Go Wild Grant (submission deadline Oct 21)

- Unclear how much funding is available until submission opens sept 15
- Previous recipients' projects include outdoor classrooms!

UFA rural communities foundation

- \$10,000-\$100,000 for projects that support recreational, educational and cultural programs in rural Alberta
- Must be a registered charity or nonprofit organization.
- Application attached.

Trustee Report

Pembina Hills East Ward 1

September 2023

The Pembina Hills Board of Trustees held the Annual Organizational Meeting on August 30, 2023. The Board Work plan was reviewed. Trustee Committees appointed.

September 20 Board Meeting, Veronica Lindquist presented on the Internal Audit process, including safety, accounting, and attendance. Report from Communications by Jan Carswell including power school, social media and internal communications.

Board Increases Representation on External Committees. In 2021, Pembina Hills received an invitation to join the Tamarack Health Advisory Council. I was directed to apply and was accepted for membership, but this council was not added as an official Board-approved committee. The Board added this council to *Policy 08 Appendix A* to facilitate the Division's ongoing participation.

Public School Boards Association of Alberta Membership was reviewed.

For the past year, Pembina Hills has been a member of the PSBAA on a trial basis. PSBAA advocates specifically for the interests of Public School boards, as opposed to separate and francophone school jurisdictions, private and charter schools, etc.

At the September 20, 2023 meeting, the Board considered whether or not to remain a member for the 2024 calendar year, as well as how many, and which meetings, trustees should attend on an annual basis. The Board decided to renew its membership for 2024 and to allow all interested trustees to participate in meetings.

Pembina Hills Staff Town Hall was on September 15 and there was a presentation by Dr.Michael Ungar.

Dr. Michael Ungar of Dalhousie University has outlined the nine things that all children and teens need to be resilient and the strategies to help them grow.

- 1. Structure
- 2. Consequences
- 3. Parent-child connections
- 4. Lots and lots of strong relationships

- 5. A powerful identity
- 6. Sense of control
- 7. Sense of belonging
- 8. Fair and just treatment
- 9. Physical and psychological safety

Each of the "Nine Things" is outlined and accompanied by "practical things caregivers can do." The clearly outlined information can be applied to children and teens.

He also explained the importance of Navigate and negotiate supports needed by youth. He did compare it to Cinderella, where would she be without her Fair Godmother? How can vulnerable youth find resources. How can we as a community help them find and access help.
